Implement Green Good Deeds

Ministry of Environment Forests and Climate Change (MoEF&CC), Government of India (GoI) has launched "Green Good Deeds Initiatives (GGDs)- a social movement for spreading environment awareness and promote good living in the country, has found acceptance by the global community. GGDs is an initiative to transform the people's behaviour into Green Good Behaviour and fulfil Green Social Responsibility towards environment conservation.

The ongoing BRICS Ministerial on Environment at Durban, South Africa, has agreed to include "Green Good Deeds" in its official agenda in the next Ministerial in Brazil and another meeting in Russia". To the adoption of Green Good Deeds by BRICS Ministerial on Environment, international conferences on Environment had been deliberating and adopting declarations. "Green Good Deeds" is an idea to take it to the people and get them involved". There was wide acceptance to the suggestion and acting Deputy Executive Director,UN Environment (UNEP) representative at the conclave, Mr. Jorge Laguna-Celis, lauded the initiative.

The good green deeds are simple, practical steps that every person may perform in day-today life that can make a visible difference to the environment. We can practice the actions listed at the individual level, community level, and corporate level, for the overall protection of the environment. The current document is meant to act as a catalyst to motivate us all to do our bit to protect and improve the environment through simple individual and collective actions. It is neither prescriptive nor directive. It attempts to make people at ground level, aware of the environmental issues in a simplified manner.

The purpose of the people-oriented campaign is to sensitise people and students, in particular about climate change and global warming.

It has been decided with the approval of competent authority that this initiative shall be implemented by Eco-Clubs under National Green Corps programme.

Ten Point Agenda to Implement Green Good Deeds, namely

- 1. Plantation drives
- 2. Plastic-free National Parks, Wildlife Sanctuaries and Biosphere Reserve
- 3. Adoption of beach / river/ lakes / parks
- 4. Garbage management

- 7. Awareness on Open Defecation Free
- 8. Hygiene and Sanitation
- 9. Adoption of village for clean habitation
- 10. Plastic-free schools/colleges


Plantation Drive

Plastic - free Campaign at Bannerughatta National Park,

Bangalore

Speaking on the occasion in order to focus its efforts on reaching out to the community and the citizens, the Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change decided to organise its theme campaign of Swachhta in National Parks, Wildlife Sanctuaries, Tiger Reserves and Zoos, where lakhs of visitors, especially youth and children come. The Protected Areas (PAs) are spread over approximately 1.61 lakh sq. km and about 32 lakh visitors come annually to the Tiger Reserves alone. Though cleanliness is a standard management practice for PAs and MoEF&CC extends assistance to States on this aspect also, as per the Action Plans proposed by the States, the campaigns were designed to focus on sensitising the visitors and tourists on issues such as solid waste management, prevention of littering and overall cleanliness of the park and surrounding areas.

Focusing on the protected area EMPRI has carried out the Plastic Ban Awareness drive at Bannerghatta National Park, Bangalore coordinating with Wildlife SOS. During the course of these campaigns plastic wastes were collected in and around Bannerghatta National Park and submitted to the BBMP and also explained about the issues such as solid waste management, prevention of littering and overall cleanliness of the park and surrounding areas.

Number of Participants: More than 100 participants from CRPF Bangalore, Volunteers, School and college students have participated in Plastic free Campaign.

Garbage Management

Population growth and particularly the development of megacities is making SWM in India a major problem. The current situation is that India relies on inadequate waste disposal infrastructure, the informal sector and waste dumping. There are major issues associated with public participation in waste management and there is generally a lack of responsibility towards waste in the community. There is a need to cultivate community awareness and change the attitude of people towards waste, as this is fundamental to developing proper and sustainable waste management systems. Sustainable and economically viable waste management must ensure maximum resource extraction from waste, combined with safe disposal of residual waste through the development of engineered landfill and waste-to-energy facilities.

Working towards this noble cause, EMPRI organised training programmes for the various departments and groups.

The Eco-Club Schools have been actively involved in Garbage management and segregation of wet & dry waste to different Bins. The waste produced in schools was disposed off in an appropriate manner and used the waste in Vermicomposting in schools by students.




Hygiene and Sanitation
